Cinematic Reunions

"After learning that traditional live Reunions would again not be possible for the Fall of 2020 due to in-person meeting restrictions, the Orient of Missouri with permission from the Southern Jurisdiction set forth a plan to create the best proverbial lemonade possible out of the lemons that were handed out during the pandemic shutdown. The goal of producing an extraordinary cinematic experience which encompassed the already established Communication of the Scottish Rite Degrees was set in place, and the mission of transmuting a golden opportunity out of circumstances made of lead was put to task.

Decisions were made not only to make the best out of an otherwise tricky situation, but to create an experience that could be shared anywhere in the world. One that would breathe exciting new life into our ancient traditions and lessons through a vivid new medium of communication. A cinematic production was the goal. A goal that was not only to get the job done and respect the certain standards of quality that our sacred Degrees deserve, but to shatter expectations, inspire others, and raise the bar for in-person traditional live reunions. A production of this extraordinary endeavor would not have been possible without all those who stepped up to the plate in dignified fashion. The production boasted a nearly 60-person cast of Brothers from all over Missouri who volunteered to participate in one capacity or another. The Cast included the SGIG of Missouri, Bro Robert W. Cockerham, 33° and Bro Ty G. Treutelaar, 32° KCCH, grand Master of Masons, Grand Lodge of Missouri at the time of production.

The production of this Cinematic Reunion is so much more than just a quirky moment in history in which the Scottish Rite was compelled to adapt to a virtual model. There remains vast potential for use of these cinematic materials in our Fraternity— from Masonic Educational tools to supplemental materials which will enhance future traditional live Reunions, and from promotional assets to inspiring modern content to use to advance the sublime lessons and teachings of our Brotherhood of Wisdom, Strength, and Beauty." "Growing"

David L. Nielsen, S.G.I.G. in Montana

I was reading a daily inspirational message recently that asked the question, "Where are you trying to grow?" It was a question to which I have not thought about in a long time. Having competed my education years ago, not being currently employed, and having learned many Masonic degrees for most of my life, I never considered pursuing any type of growth, whether intellectually, spiritually, occupationally, or fraternally.

After I finally completed my formal education and started a career in the practice of law, the State Bar of Montana made continuing legal education mandatory. Prior to that change, it was voluntary. Being fresh out of school I was confident that there was little that I could learn. I had a good foundation of knowledge for my profession, though my experience level was nil.

Over my career I attended continuing legal education, and on occasion would give a presentation. I enjoyed participating in the CLE's and over time appreciated that the growth was beneficial in my career.

The same is true of our learning in Masonic degrees. We are a candidate in them, we watch them given to others, and later we are giving the degrees. Taking the extra 29 degrees of Scottish Rite, builds our confidence that we are Masons and prepared to practice that art. When we have the distinction of receiving additional honorary degrees, it really convinces us that we have Masonry down pat.

The question then is "Where are we trying to grow in Masonry?" Can we add more insight and understanding of the principles of Masonry, or have we gained it all? Observing or participating in any degree many times always teaches me a new lesson and understanding that I never appreciated before. Just as I was not a fully developed lawyer immediately upon graduation, I was not a fully developed Mason merely because I saw the degrees once. This is the essence of why we have Reunions in Scottish Rite. It is not just to initiate new candidates, it is the continuing education of all our members.

This year the Supreme Council, with the generosity of the Orient of Missouri, is making available to the other Orients and Valleys in the Southern Jurisdiction, the Missouri Cinematic Reunion for use in Reunions and for education. This cinematic reunion can augment the lessons learned in the communicated degrees, by showing the staging, costumes, props, and actions found in the conferred versions. I encourage every Scottish Rite member in the Orient of Montana to attend a reunion, and especially ones that have this added feature. This is guaranteed to give growth to your Masonic understanding.

He came from a poor hardworking coal mining family. In 1943 he lost loved ones in the explosion at the Smith Mine that killed 74 miners. He was a tremendous athlete excelling in football, basketball, track, and boxing. After graduating he joined the Air Force and served many years active and inactive. To my knowledge he had few vices, didn't smoke, or consume alcohol (probably the reason for his longevity).

On September 25, 1963, President John F. Kennedy visited Billings. 17,000 Montanans flooded the Yellowstone County Fairgrounds to hear him speak. Being employed by the Bureau of Reclamation, Bob received top security clearance and had the special honor of being in the motorcade riding in the second car behind the President.

Make sure to take frequent opportunities to spend quality time with your loved ones and if possible, make amends with your adversaries before it is **too** late.

"How best to explain the Scottish Rite Cinematic Reunion? As one may or may not already be aware, there are two distinct methods by which a Candidate may become a 32° Scottish Rite Mason. The first method is receiving the Degrees of the Scottish Rite by traditional Conferral, in which the Degrees are played out by a cast of Scottish Rite Masons. The second method is a more expedient, whereby the Candidate will receive a brief synopsis of the Degree, including the symbols and lessons contained therein, followed by the official Charge—the "secret-work," or explanation and extrapolation of the Degree's symbols and lessons— and then will assume the Obligation of the Degree. This method is known as Communication and was written and developed by the Scottish Rite Ritual Committee of the Supreme Council. Such means may be employed by authorized Scottish Rite Masons when circumstances do not allow for the full theatrical production of any Degree. Rather than filming the actual Degree work, which the Southern Jurisdiction does not permit, we endeavored to produce an elaborate and superior-quality cinematic vision of the method of receiving the Degrees by Communication.

The Cinematic Reunion has been a transformative, inspiring, and deeply enriching Masonic experience for the thousands who have taken part thus far, and we encourage all who have not yet experienced this cinematic journey to look forward to future opportunities in which to participate."
