THE RITE CORNER

"Light and Service"

As we close in on the Winter Solstice—that day of the year that has more darkness than light—we notice that gradually the daylight hours become shorter, and the night darkness expands with each passing day. In other words, the Winter Solstice is the end of a daily trend with increased darkness and starts a reversed course of increasing daylight in its following days. This annual astronomical phenomenon has been a catalyst of influence in the development of religious traditions and continues even as today. The dichotomy between darkness and light is symbolic of the struggle between the darkness of evil and the light of hope for salvation. For Masons the Winter Solstice is symbolic of going from a period of mental darkness to the new light of knowledge and wisdom. In Masonry, to receive Light is to gain knowledge for a life of love—with charity and compassion for those in distress. The acquisition of the Light of Masonic knowledge and wisdom brings an enhanced awareness of our duty to care for those in need.

Acquiring the Light of Love and Knowledge, which teaches us to provide care for all in need, does not of itself result in a desired outcome. It requires action, work. We learn that we should practice compassionate service, but somehow, we do not always put that lesson into action. In the installation ceremony for Scottish Rite Valleys, the charge to the officers says:

"Simple ideas of a brotherhood which require no sacrifice and of a morality in which there is nothing new, cannot move the world. The Masonry of today cannot be inaction, or fitful, and ill directed action toward no object worthy of great toil and great sacrifice."

Masonry, and especially Scottish Rite Freemasonry, is more than just acquiring knowledge and wisdom. It is about acting, even when the task is difficult.

In my Masonic journey, I have learned of the need to care for those in distress, but just learning of a need is not the same as providing actual comfort. Admittedly, I have found that writing a check to a body that will provide the service is easier and quicker. Though charities need money to function, sometimes that is not as effective as plain old hands-on help. There is a satisfaction in providing service in person, rather than paying for others to do it.

My new service this year has been helping provide showers to homeless persons in Helena, through a partnership between Helena United Way and St. Paul's United Methodist Church. I thought about it before hand for a while but had to overcome my discomfort in helping homeless persons face-to-face. Even with my background as a criminal defense lawyer, I did not know if my experiences would help me deal with the social dynamics of homelessness. I had read about homelessness and its challenges to local government, but I had never worked directly with a homeless person. I know homeless persons are stereotyped as all being violent, criminal, chemically dependent, lazy, beggars and unskilled. I confess that before I started helping to serve homeless persons, I would quickly pass by them, avoiding eye contact for fear they would speak to me.

Patricia "Pat" Rehberg (née Cooley) passed away on October 25th due to complications associated with an aggressive form of thyroid cancer. She was comforted by the many blessings that accompany a full, well-lived life.

Pat was born on November 15, 1933, on a ranch outside of Lame Deer, Montana to Ray and Dorothy (Herman) Cooley. She attended kindergarten in Hardin and received the rest of her education in Billings. She fondly remembered her time at Rimrock Elementary, where she spent recess and lunch breaks exploring the Rims and wading in the High Ditch. She attended Lincoln Junior High and graduated from Billings Senior High School in 1951. Following graduation, she enrolled at Eastern Montana College (EMC) and to her family's surprise, became a member of the cheerleading squad.

The course of nature derailed her studies when she (not so reluctantly) agreed to wed the neighborhood boy who was hell bent on marrying her. On June 27, 1952, Pat and Jack Rehberg were married at St. Luke's Episcopal Church, a union that lasted 68 years, and would have lasted at least 68 more if given the chance.

Following her marriage to Jack, they moved into a trailer at the Midland Guernsey Dairy. While Jack and his brother Wally ran the daily operations of the dairy, Pat spent her time putting the final touches (tarring the walls and installing a proper kitchen) on the cabin atop the Rims that would become the home where they would raise their children. While raising their two children on the family ranch, Pat helped Jack when needed by baking pies (from scratch) that were a staple at the Milky Way Drive-In, a local diner owned and operated by Jack and his mother.

When their children finished grade school, Pat re-enrolled at EMC, earning her Bachelor's Degree in Elementary Education. She spent the next eight years teaching 1st grade at Miles Avenue Elementary before becoming a traveling reading specialist guiding new teachers on the fundamentals of reading for grade school students. During these years she enjoyed spending her summers camping and boating with her family in Yellowstone Park and Yellowtail.

Despite her claims that she was the "country side" of the marriage, as opposed to her more "sophisticated" husband, Pat will forever be remembered by friends and family for her consummate poise and grace. She enjoyed and took pride in many of life's simple pleasures, reading, knitting, cooking, and providing boundless love to her family and friends. She was an active member of P.E.O., Chapter E, a member of multiple book clubs, an accomplished hand and machine knitter, and the person who could effortlessly throw together a proper feast for a party of twenty at a moment's notice. She hosted Sunday family dinners well into her eighties, an event that was opt-out as opposed to opt-in, thus bestowing upon those who would not attend the unfortunate duty of personally notifying her ahead of time.

Throughout her life, Pat took the time to remind the people around her how much she cared for them. There was no gift received, nor kind gesture offered, that did not receive a hand-written thank-you card. During the first night of a NILE rodeo, one of the cowboy's shirts was torn, so he removed it and tossed it to Pat who was seated in the first row. That night, she washed and mended the shirt, folded it neatly, and returned it to the young man the following night with a hand written note expressing her gratitude and offering some kind words of advice.

An older member from another chapter has moved to Billings to attend college and has really stepped up and helped the Chapter. We have a movie pizza night scheduled here in early December as a fun activity.

Their heroic loyalty glorifies our human nature and sets an example worthy of our emulation. No man, young or old, can enjoy a higher honor than to be valued as a friend and trusted as a brother.

Pat enjoyed the laid-back lifestyle aboard a cruise ship. She and Jack shared their love of cruising with their family, taking all of their grandchildren on a cruise for their eighteenth birthdays. It was on these cruises that most of them learned the true depth of their Granny's love and patience. Granny was, after all, equal parts Mary Poppins and Ms. Manners, with a dash of Calamity Jane.

Pat is survived by her children Shanna (David) Henry and Dennis (Janice) Rehberg, her brother Robert (Sheri) Cooley, her five grandchildren, Jaclyn, Ryan, AJ, Katie, and Elsie, and seven great-grandchildren. Since I started in this new duty, I found the homeless persons that I met did not meet the stereotyping. They were people entitled to respect, who enjoyed conversing with people, did not seek handouts, and appreciated that others cared for them. In listening to their stories, I met a homeless person with a college degree in engineering, a Canadian Cree Indian who was taken from his family at age 3 and placed in numerous foster homes while attending government schools to eradicate his ethnicity and Native language, a man who lives in a tent and mines for gold, a woman who handstitched her own clothing, a woman who is physically disabled while her husband is in state prison, and a young man who understood that his addiction to alcohol was his downfall. The few homeless persons I serve are human beings who have hopes, resourcefulness and wish for a warmer life.

In talking to Mark, who works for a charitable program to help homeless persons, he explained that programs like providing showers was more beneficial to the homeless than just a shower. It created an environment where homeless persons can socially interact with people who are not homeless. As a person who had been homeless for 20 plus years, Mark said having opportunities to meet and visit with people who are not in distress can be therapeutic in their rehabilitation. Even small opportunities for homeless persons to experience interaction with "normalcy" can add up to great results.

As we enjoy gaining the added daily light after the Winter Solstice, learning the Masonic Light we experience, and gaining knowledge and wisdom on making our world a better, healthier place for everyone, please remember to take the second step of acting on it.
